Bandy, the singing professor

e has created some 250 songs, in Bengali, Hindi, English and Sanskrit languages. His recorded songs have been played on radio and TV channels across the globe. Meet Dr Srikanta Bandyopadhyay who is now famous as Bandy, the singing professor.
